Message From The Director

I am responsible for reporting our usage and relevant statistics to the state and to the library board on an annual basis. Having just completed those reports, I thought I should share how we did in 2020. What can we say about library use in 2020? If I were to borrow a line from Dr. Seuss' Grinch in regards to COVID, "The three words that best describe you are as follows, and I quote 'Stink, stank, stunk!"

While we were slow to close our doors, and quick to open them in relation to other libraries, we were definitely impacted by the virus. As a result of that stanky COVID, our stats are significantly down in comparison to previous years. 2020 Visits to our library = 437,788 (15% higher than comparable national libraries pre-COVID, but...)

- 32% decrease from previous year
- 38% average decrease in library visits across Utah
- 66% decrease in visits in Salt Lake County (OUCH!)
 2020 Circulation/# of Checkouts = 877,642 (30% higher than comparable national libraries pre-COVID)
- 39% decrease from previous year
- 20% average decrease in circulation across Utah
- 2 libraries actually increased their circulation (Salt Lake City and Orem weird)
- 23% increase in electronic circulations (silver lining, we continued to rise in ebook checkouts)

2020 PROGRAMMING -

- 1,540 Programs held (37% decrease. Instead we created take home kits for patrons)
- 42% average decrease in number of programs held in comparable Utah libraries
- 30,466 attendees at those programs (56% decrease. COVID...stunk.)
- 49% average decrease in program attendance for comparable Utah libraries

A few other interesting stats, we have 177.5K residents in Washington County, and 121.8K library card holders. While a portion of those are nonresident cardholders, approximately 65% of our residents hold library cards. That's good! Spread the word, lets make that number grow!

Another interesting comparison is with the tax rate. We are the 5th largest library in the state, but of the 27 libraries that have a dedicated tax rate, we are 16th. The average tax rate is .000329, the median tax rate is .000319, and our tax rate is .000189. Multiply that rate by your home value for how much you pay for library services. Bottom line, we provide great services at bottom dollar prices!

I look forward to leaving 2020 in the past, and reconnecting with you in the library!
