It is discouraging that some of the major publishers are refusing to sell eBooks to public libraries. We remain hopeful and are committed to finding a workable solution so that eBooks are available to our customers of all ages.

In spite of the restrictions placed by the big six publishers, Washington County Library System continues to provide access to an array of eBooks and eAudiobooks through Utah State Library's Online Library Consortium and Axis 360 ebook collection, both are available through our website at www.library.washco.utah.gov under the eResources tab.

OverDrive-

Download best-selling audiobooks, eBooks and videos from OverDrive 24/7 to your PC, Mac, or portable device. All you need is your library card to get started.

Axis 360-

Provides ebooks for use by Washington County Library patrons. Works with Android tablets, iPhone, iPad, and Windows PCs. Login with your library card number.

We know that you want to look fabulous on Halloween, but did you know that some costumes can be bad for your health as well as the planet? Here are a few facts and tips to help make your Halloween less toxic so that you can keep looking fabulous and healthy when Halloween is over.

Many costumes that are made from plastic contain PVC. Although PVC is versatile, it contains and emits dioxin while it's being created, being used, and breaking down. Look for PVC alternatives when costume hunting.

Halloween Safety Tips

For many people, autumn events like Halloween and Harvest Day are fun times to dress up in costumes, go trick-or-treating, attend parties, and eat yummy treats. These events are also opportunities to provide nutritious snacks, get physical activity, and focus on safety.

Below are tips to help make the festivities fun and safe for trick-ortreaters and party guests

- Swords, knives, and similar costume accessories should be short, soft, and flexible.
- Avoid trick-or-treating alone. Walk in groups or with a trusted adult.
 - Fasten reflective tape to costumes and bags to help drivers see you.
 - Examine all treats for choking hazards and tampering before eating them. Limit the amount of treats you eat.
 - Hold a flashlight while trick-or-treating to help you see and others see you. Always WALK and don't run.
 - Always test make-up in a small area first. Remove it before bedtime to prevent possible skin and eye irritation.
 - Look both ways before crossing the street. Use established crosswalks wherever possible.
 - Lower your risk for serious eye injury by not wearing decora-
 - tive contact lenses. Only walk on sidewalks whenever possible, or on the far
 - edge of the road facing traffic to stay safe.
 - Wear well-fitting masks, costumes, and shoes to avoid blocked vision, trips, and falls.
 - Eat only factory-wrapped treats. Avoid eating homemade treats made by strangers.
 - Enter homes only if you're with a trusted adult.
 - Never walk near lit candles or luminaries. Be sure to wear flame-resistant costumes.
