




Message From The Director

This year we have had many changes in the world with wars between Russia - Ukraine, or headlines with Israel - Hamas. As we enter a season of thanks, we are probably reflecting on these and other events in the world around us. There are many things to be thankful for in each of our lives. These may include family, friends, a land of abundance, freedoms, jobs, co-workers, and the list could go on. We certainly hope the library and its resources are high on your list: they are on mine. The list may be different for each of us. Growing up, in elementary school and at home we always recalled the "First Thanksgiving" with the Pilgrims in 1621; however, this celebration doesn't date back to 1621 continuously. There have been gaps and breaks in this beloved American tradition. Have you ever considered who the first U.S. President was to proclaim a "Thanksgiving Day"? George Washington. In part he had this to say on October 3, 1789:

"By the President of the United States of America, a Proclamation.

Whereas it is the duty of all Nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey his will, to be grateful for his benefits, and humbly to implore his protection and favor-- and whereas both Houses of Congress have by their joint Committee requested me to recommend to the People of the United States a day of public thanksgiving and prayer to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many signal favors of Almighty God [....]

Now therefore I do recommend and assign Thursday the 26th day of November next to be devoted by the People of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being, who is the beneficent Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be-- That we may then all unite in rendering unto him our sincere and humble thanks--for his kind care[...]"
