## Message From The Director

"A Penny for Your Thoughts"

In the July Newsletter I wrote about Sir Thomas Moore, and we return to him again this month for the credit on this quotation and notion. The earliest recorded use of this phrase dates back to the 16th century. It appears in Sir Thomas Moore's work "Four Last Things" (1522), where he wrote: "As it often happeth, that the very face sheweth the mind walking a pilgrimage, another time saith hee, 'A penny for your thought."

Inflation is the enemy of all and at his writing, a penny held much more value than it does today, so the offer wasn't trite or small as it might now seem. It was a sincere way of expressing interest in someone's inner world. Although, with the passage of time the value of a penny has fallen, and may be discontinued in U.S. circulation, by the 19th century, it was commonly used in both British and American English as a phrase.

The phrase "a penny for your thoughts" is often used to ask someone what they're thinking, especially when they appear quiet, distracted, or lost in contemplation. It's a polite way to show curiosity and encourage someone to share what's on their mind. It is not really an offer, despite the mention of money, to pay them something—it's metaphorical. The "penny" represents a small but sincere token of interest, showing that the speaker values the other person's thoughts, however trivial or profound they may be.

With that introduction, I provide a few thoughts on the library and the future: Having been in the library world for decades—I can say without hesitation, there is a future and libraries are still vibrant and growing. Some have predicted the death of libraries with the advent of computers, the internet, the electronic format, modern transportation, inexpensive materials, printers at home and office, COVID-19, and the list goes on.

I was recently at a conference for library directors in the State of Utah, and I can say the future is filled with optimism and vision. In fact, in Washington

County we have greater need to look at building expansion, and not contraction. We appreciate our patrons and your support and patronage.
