# Message From The Director

There have been gaps and breaks in this beloved American tradition. Have you ever considered who the first U.S. President was to proclaim a "Thanksgiving Day"?

George Washington. In part he had this to say on October 3, 1789: "By the President of the United States of America, a Proclamation. Whereas it is the duty of all Nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey his will, to be grateful for his benefits, and humbly to implore his protection and favor— and whereas both Houses of Congress have by their joint Committee requested me to recommend to the People of the United States a day of public thanksgiving and prayer to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many signal favors of Almighty God [....]

Now therefore I do recommend and assign Thursday the 26th day of November next to be devoted by the People of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being, who is the beneficent Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be--That we may then all unite in rendering unto him our sincere and humble thanks--for his kind care [....]"






# Honoring Our Heroes on Veterans Day

For many, Veterans Day might simply mean a long weekend or a break from the daily routine—but its true meaning runs far deeper. This November 11th, we pause to honor the brave men and women who have worn the uniform of the United States Armed Forcesthe Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force, Coast Guard, and Space

Force—each dedicating themselves to the defense of our great nation and the freedoms we hold dear.

Originally known as Armistice Day, the holiday was first established to mark the end of World War I.
