Have you considered the origin of the phrase “Luck of the Irish”? It no longer denotes the original intent, and has lost the bite of criticism, but is now lighthearted and more whimsical by nature, with no ill undertones.

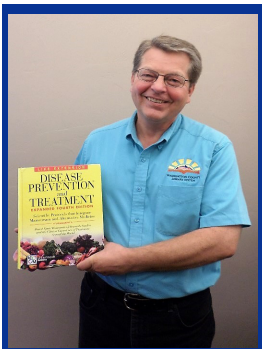
The attribution comes from the American West of the 1800s. It was a disparaging way of pointing to the Irish immigrants who made a mining strike or hit it big. Like many others, they were looking for and prospecting hard for gold or silver, but jealousy does not make allowance, it only points a finger. In part, the Irish potato famine had introduced a level of poverty and privation that gave incentive and motivation to strike it rich in the mining camps. This notion of luck is underscored in the fact that the Irish held to many Celtic myths and legends. These tales were full of examples that focused on good luck and bad luck, which could often be bestowed by magical beings capable of both good fortune and much mischief. While there is a long list for both, part of the fun is in the adventure of discovery of peoples and of their cultures.

If you do not have your four-leaf clover, you are still in luck at the library. Regardless, it can be your lucky day—any day you come. We can help you learn more about Ireland, or even provide books to aid in a visit to the Emerald Isles. If you are looking for some entertainment, you could consider *The Quiet Man* with John Wayne and Maureen O’Hara. Perhaps you want a little music to set the tone for St. Patrick’s Day, and you could check out *36 Irish Sing-a-longs*. However, if you are feeling like doing an Irish jig you could choose instead *Come dance with me in Ireland*. If folklore is more your thing and you want to entertain a child, Ashley

Gish wrote a book called, *Leprechauns: Amazing mysteries*. These are just a few items you can find at the library, so don’t push your luck—come in and enjoy the day or season as you choose. .

## Words, Words, Words!



even the most trivial words and expressions we read every day jump off the page and find new life.

In Act 2, Scene 2 of Shakespeare’s famous play, Polonius finds Hamlet reading a book and asks him what he is reading. In a 17th-century example of sarcasm, the protagonist replies, “Words, words, words.” On the one hand, one can see words on a page, meaningless without any context; on the other hand, with a little focus and attention,

I have found that for each individual, words carry social, historic and cultural baggage based on our experiences and interactions. While a dialect may refer to the language a family, neighborhood or region speaks, we all speak our own idiolect; the speech habits particular to each person. This idiolect is formed not only by the people we have spent time with, but by the books we have read and words we come across and seek to add to our own personal lexicon. In our library, we have this book: “That Doesn’t Mean What You Think It Means” by Ross and Kathryn Petras.

The lens through which I see the world was crafted in the Wild West in Cheyenne, Wyoming, in a large family with involved parents. I was exposed to multiple languages early on through music and friends. I remember conversations with people as though each word were etched in my memory. I remember when I learned to spell the word “Saturday” from the Bay City Rollers. I remember my brother teaching me the difference between “wrestling” and “wrassling”. My sister corrected my pronunciation of the word “burger” as opposed to “booger.” My friend, Juan, taught me that to “lick” someone in a fight didn’t translate straight across to Spanish. Phrases carry their own meaning greater than the sum of their parts. Colorful expressions such as “Busier than a one-legged man in a butt-kicking contest”, “One fry short of a happy meal” and “Finer than frog’s hair” are all included in this book in our library: “Cowboy slang: Colorful Cowboy sayings” by Frosty Potter.

My early exposure to literature taught me words like Pygmalion, acquiesce and courtier. I remember the exact moment I came across those words, asking parents or teachers to define them for me and being told to either figure it out or look it up on my own. Robert Louis Stevenson’s *Treasure Island* taught me nostalgic-sounding words that, despite falling out of common usage, are still fun to bring up in conversation. Expressions like “Milady” and “Avast” are all included alongside “Shiver my timbers” in *The Pirate Primer* by George Choundas in our library. The last one in this list comes from the way cannonballs shook the boat upon impact. What a great image to have in mind next time you hear that phrase! Pick up these books and more and relish in the richness of our language. By the way, we have the book *Hamlet* in our library too. :-).

## National Women's History Month

In 1987, the U.S. Congress officially designated March as National Women's History Month, creating an opportunity to recognize and celebrate the achievements of women throughout American history. Each year highlights the women who have shaped our communities, expanded opportunities, and worked to create a more just and inclusive society.



Women's History Month invites us to reflect on their lasting contributions. Abigail Adams—wife and mother of U.S. presidents—was also an early advocate for women's rights, education, and the abolition of slavery. Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton helped lead the fight for women's suffrage, with Anthony famously casting an illegal vote in 1872 and facing arrest for it.

Leaders such as Sojourner Truth, Rosa Parks, and Coretta Scott King advanced civil rights through courage and determination. These remarkable women, and many others, helped shape the nation we know today. Discover their stories and more at your library!
