
Culture. Pardon me while I follow that down the rabbit hole. According to Merriam-Webster, 1. culture is the customary beliefs, social forms, material traits, and characteristic features of everyday existence shared by people in a place or time. Examples can include popular culture, southern culture, or the Dixie Spirit! 2. Organizational culture is a shared set of attitudes, values, goals, and practices that help define the organization. And culture can also be a manifestation of enlightenment and excellence through art, humanities, and other forms of creative and intellectual expression.

Actors, writers, musicians, sports players, politicians, and other popular members of society may have a larger influence, but there are a lot of different perspectives that help build

that culture.


The Legacy of Sitting Bull - History @ the Library


A man who I greatly admire is Sitting Bull, chief of the Lakota Sioux. He was born in South Dakota in 1831 and died at the age of 59 in 1890 at Standing Rock Indian Reservation.


As a child, Sitting Bull was known as "slow" because he would think deeply before he spoke. As an adult, Sitting Bull reflected courage and calmness under pressure. As well as being chief of the Lakota Sioux people, Sitting Bull was a great spiritual leader and warrior. He fought to defend the Black Hills.

On June 25, 1876 there was a battle at Little Bighorn River, Montana known as "Custer's Last Stand." In that battle the famous Lieutenant Colonel George Armstrong Custer was killed. This was the Battle of Little Bighorn and one last victory for the Sioux people.

In 1885 at the age of 54, Sitting Bull joined Buffalo Bill Cody's Wild West Show. There he met and became friends with Annie Oakley.







He called her "Little Sure Shot."

Five years later, in 1890, Lakota policemen

gathered at Sitting Bull's cabin to arrest him. There he was shot and killed along with his son Crow Foot.
